

# Mrs Dowdall recommends: Three books to help develop empathy...

Empathy is such an important and special skill to have. Research shows that reading books really helps us to develop empathy, helping us to understand how other people might feel. Here are some of my favourite books that help to build empathy...

#### EYFS and Key Stage 1

'The Suitcase' by Chris Naylor-Ballesteros

This wonderful picture book helps us to understand the importance of kindness and friendship. A wonderful book to

share, it is sure to spark lots of conversation with its powerful, yet simple, message.



Lower Key Stage 2

'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Q. Rauf

This gem of a novel has won multiple awards for its sensitive way of dealing with the refugee crisis. A new boy, Ahmet, joins the class and some of his new classmates show him kindness and empathy. It is probably best suited for Year 4 upwards or more mature Year 3s.

Upper Key Stage 2


'A Kind of Spark' by Ellie McNicoll

This beautiful story is told from the point of view of an 11 year old girl called Addie. She is determined to create a memorial for women in her town who were accused of witchcraft and in the process, changes the way other people view her too. Completely unput-downable!

## What is your favourite book and why?






