




Reading Newsletter Number 8


Lower Key Stage 2



'The Last Bear' by Hannah Gold

This is a gem of a book, only recently published. April goes to live in the Arctic with her Dad who is a scientist. She is told there are no bears where they are but April finds one and a magical friendship is formed. This amazing debut novel tackles climate change and humans' relationship with the natural world. 8+

Upper Key Stage 2



'Northchild' by Edith Pattou

This beautifully told story, with its roots in the magic of fairy tales, is an epic novel to really get caught up in. Although it is a long book, it is told in short chapters that move quickly and are full of adventure and action. 9+

Age: 10+



Ms Hayhurst—Year 1

What is your favourite book and why?

My favourite children's book is 'Leon and the Place Between' by Angela McAllister. It's about a boy who is transported to a magical world by a magician. It's beautifully written, with lots of rich description that sparks your imagination and helps you to picture the setting in your head. The illustrations are so detailed and interesting; each time I look at them, I spot something new.


Why is reading important to me?

When and where do you like to read?



I really like to read outside in the sunshine but, because we live in cold England, I also like to snuggle up on the sofa with a cup of tea and chocolate to read.

Finding new books...


