As the nights draw in, there is nothing better than getting cosy and stuck into a brilliant book. Here are three of my favourite comfort reads for the Autumn season!



'Tree: A Peek-Through Picture Book' by Britta Teckentrup

This gorgeous picture book takes you on a journey through the seasons. It is richly illustrated with clever holes cut into the pages. The story itself is beautifully written and rhymes. Perfect for bedtime!

Lower Key Stage 2

'Amelia Fang and the Barbaric Ball' by Laura Anderson

This is the first book in the Amelia
Fang series. A fun set of books about
Amelia, who is a little vampire
with a big heart! These funny
books, full of strange creatures
and jokes, are perfect for age 7
upwards.



'October, October' by Katya Balen.

October is a little girl who lives with her father in the woods. She loves her life living in the wilds but when she turns 11, everything changes. This prize-winning, heart-breaking novel is a story about coping with change and family relationships.



Children's Recommendations

We always ask our children to share their favourite reading recommendations. Here are a few of the books they have read and enjoyed lately...

'Superworm,' by Julia Donaldson, recommended by one of our Reception students...

My favourite book is Superworm. It is really funny and I like the rhyme in the story.

For babies and older!



There's a Diplodocus at the Door' by Ruth Symons, recommended by one of our Year 3 students...

This book has lots of facts in it about diplodocus dinosaurs. It also imagines what it would be like if a diplodocus was around today!

For Reception upwards.

'Kay's Marvellous Medicine,' by Adam Kay, recommended by one of our Year 5 students...

This non-fiction book is about the olden days and what diseases occurred at that time (e.g. the Black Death in the Middle Ages). It's not at all boring and is actually really funny and written in a chatty way. The pages are full of facts and information and at the end of each chapter there is a little quiz to make sure you've understood the chapter.

I would recommend this book for Year 5 upwards.

I am currently reading a book for adults called 'Dead Lions' by Mick Heron. It is a spy story about using intelligence and is part of a series.


Why is reading important to you?

National Poetry Day



In Key Stage 2 you should be reading aloud to someone or reading independently for 30 minutes a night!
