At this time of year it is lovely to curl up with a book and really be transported to other worlds. I love fantasy stories and so this term have chosen three books that include wonderful dragon

characters!

EYFS and Key Stage 1

'The Worst Princess' by Anna Kemp

This brilliantly empowering book is all about Sue who manages to escape a rather annoying prince with the help of a dragon. It is very funny, written in rhyme and the illustrations by Sara Ogilvie are wonderful. A super bedtime read!

Lower Key Stage 2

'The Boy Who Grew Dragons' by Andy Shepherd

This fun chapter book follows the adventures of Tomas who discovers a strange old tree at the bottom of his grandad's garden. When he takes the funny fruit from the tree back into the house he gets the shock and delight of his life when a tiny dragon hatches!

Upper Key Stage 2

'Darwin's Dragons' by Lindsay Galvin

Syms Covington has landed the job of a lifetime - cabin boy and fiddler on Charles Darwin's Beagle. But when he becomes shipwrecked on a Galapagos island, he makes a discovery that could change the world - and make his fortune. But should he share his find, or will it lead to the extinction of a legendary species?

# Children's Recommendations

We always ask our children to share their favourite reading recommendations. Here are a few of the books Year 6 have read and enjoyed lately...

'Agatha Oddly: Murder at the Museum' by Lena Jones.

Agatha has just stumbled upon her next big case, a murder at the British Museum! However, after a bit of digging, Agatha begins to suspect that a wider plot is afoot below London, involving a disused tube station, a huge fireworks display and five thousand tonnes of gold! These books are really entertaining and full of mystery. Recommended for ages 9 upwards...



#### 'Orphans of the Tide' trilogy by Struan Murray

These books are very detailed with the perfect mix of action, suspense and thriller. When a mysterious boy washes in with the tide, the citizens believe he's the Enemy - the god who drowned the world - come again to cause untold chaos. This is an amazing trilogy full of horror and suspense. I recommend it for ages 10 and up.






#### 'The Ice Monster' by David Walliams

Ice Monster is a book in which an unusual friendship occurs between a girl and a woolly mammoth. When Elsie, an orphan on the streets of Victorian London, hears about the mysterious Ice Monster - a woolly mammoth found at the North Pole - she's determined to discover more...

A chance encounter brings Elsie face to face with the creature, and sparks the adventure of a lifetime - from London to the heart of the Arctic! Recommended for ages 8 upwards...

#### Mrs Morris' Interview

#### What is your favourite book and why?

As a child, one of my favourites was Danny the Champion of the World by Roald Dahl . I loved all the planning and scheming and the anticipation as to whether they (a father and son) would be able to pull off their elaborate plot. I really must re-read the book as an adult, which is always so enjoyable as you are able to re-live the memories from your first read!

#### When and where do you like to read?

Whenever I have time, usually before bed, on holiday, or a talking book (audiobook). I also LOVE reading bedtime stories to my son, who is 4. Tonight we read: The Jolly Christmas Postman, Memory Bottles and Kitchen Disco.

#### What are you currently reading?

I've actually just been picking out a few new titles to take on holiday with me. One of the selected books is all about the rewilding of a farm in Sussex. It was a gift from a friend that I've been wanting to read for some time. Books make the best presents!

#### Why is reading important to you?

It's a chance to get lost in another world for a little while, to go back in time (I do love historical fiction!) or to make yourself laugh or even cry sometimes. Sharing a book is also a wonderful gift lake FOGES

#### This term's author is: Katherine Rundell

Katherine Rundell is a bestselling author whose novels for children include Rooftoppers, The Wolf Wilder, The Explorer and The Good Thieves. Rooftoppers was inspired by her time spent climbing onto the rooftops of Oxford University! She has won the Costa Children's Book Award, the Blue Peter Book Award and the Waterstones Children's Book Prize and was a 2021 World Book Day author. Katherine spent her childhood in Africa and Europe before taking her degree at the University of Oxford and becoming a Fellow of All Souls College. We have loads of her books in school for you to borrow!
















## Some reading news from the Autumn term...



### Story Swaps
